


Articles With/Without a DOI (Links for APA Article Citations)

When citing journal articles retrieved online it is necessary to either provide the DOI (Digital Object Identifier) for the article or a link to the journal publisher's home page.

Article HAS a DOI

Article DOES NOT HAVE a DOI

If the article does not have a DOI you will need to find the home page for the journal publisher's web site.

Example:

For an article was published in the journal, *Journal of Community Nursing*, the link for the APA citation would be: <http://www.jcn.co.uk>

How to Find the Journal Publisher's Home Page

Perform a Google search for the journal title with quotation marks around the title.

i.e. "*Journal of Community Nursing*".
